#### **SCHEME OF EXAMINATION: BVA Course**

#### 1. THEORY:

Each theory paper offered in a semester shall carry a maximum of 100 marks, with which 40% is for internal assessment marks and 60% is for examination marks.

Theory examination will be each semester.

#### 2. **PRACTICALS**:

Each practical paper offered in a semester shall carry a maximum of 100 marks, with 50 % internal assessment marks and 50 % examination marks.

Practical exams will be odd and even semester. But odd semester examination evaluation will be only by two internal examiners. Even semester Examination evaluation will be one internal examiner and one external examiner or two external examiners if there are no internal examiners.

#### 3. INTERNAL ASSESSMENT MARKS:

The Internal assessment marks awarded to the students of theory and practical subjects shall displayed on the notice board of the college before commencement of theory or practical examinations, whichever is earlier and a certified statement copy of I.A marks shall be sent to the University i.e., Registrar (evaluation). The I.A marks statement copy shall bear the signature of the concerned subject Faculty, HOD and Co-ordinator or Principal.

#### 4. VALUATION OF PRACTICAL EXAMINATION PAPER:

- a) Odd semester (First, Third, Fifth and Seventh semester) practical paper, Display, Jury and Viva shall be valued by two internal examiner and even semester (Second, Fourth, Sixth and Eighth semester) practical paper, Display, Jury and Viva shall be valued by two valuers -one internal and one should be external examiners from the panel of examiners prospered by the concerned B.O.S. and approved by the University. Each specialization Fourth, Sixth and Eighth semester including second semester practical examination shall be jointly evaluated by one internal examiner and one external examiner or two external examiners if there are no internal examiners.
- b) Minimum for a pass in each Theory 35% and Practical paper shall be 50% aggregate (exam Paper and internal assessment together).
